

Chef de Chemin De Fer 2010, Persist till we succeed!


I look forward to 2020 as a Great year for Grand du Illinois for all of us!

MARION COUNTY 40 & 8 VOITURE 516 PROMENADE

F-117 HISTORY PAR I—DEVELOPMENT MACE CARPENTER OCTOBER 10, 2019

As early as World War II, radar became a nemesis of airpower. Radar had an ability to detect aircraft at long ranges so defending nations could mount a defense and guide antiaircraft systems against them. Radar played a major role in the Battle of Britain, allowing the outnumbered Royal Air Force to scramble to meet and defeat the attacking German aircraft. In the Vietnam War, thousands of aircraft were lost, most due to the impact of radar guided surface-to-air missiles systems. A solution was required.

As early as World War II, efforts became to mitigate radar's capabilities to detect attacking aircraft. These efforts began in earnest in the early 1970s. With a Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) initiative and US Air Force support, Lockheed eventually won a contract to produce a stealthy fighter. Lockheed was able to design an aircraft that was "invisible" to many types of radar, and extremely hard to detect by others. Ironically, the foundation of this effort was a 1963 Soviet Union mathematician's published paper, "Method of Edge Waves in the Physical Theory of Diffraction." Petr Ufimtsev determined that radar return strength is based on the edge configuration, not size of an object or aircraft. He gained permission to publish his research results internationally because they were considered to be of no significant military or economic value. A stealth engineer at Lockheed, Denys Overholser, read the Russian's paper and understood that Ufimtsev developed the mathematical theory for the analysis of radar returns. This understanding stimulated stealth design and was critical in manufacturing the first stealth aircraft—the F-117. Northrop competed for the F-117 contract and used Ufimtsev's mathematics to help design the B-2 bomber. Ben Rich the father of stealth—succeeded Kelly Johnson as the leader of the Lockheed Skunkworks and led the development and production of the F-117.

In 1976, Lockheed was contracted by DARPA to produce two full-scale aircraft as part of the Have Blue Project. A complex computer system adjusted for aircraft instability. To expedite development, the aircraft used an F16 flight control system, A10 landing gear, T38 engines, and C-130 environmental systems. Although both prototypes were destroyed in accidents, stealth was proven. In 1978, full-scale production aircraft approved. Again, to speed development, the aircraft used many existing aircraft systems that included an F-16 flight control system, F-18 cockpit, F-15E displays and a B-52 navigation system. In August 1981, the first operational aircraft was delivered to Tonopah, Nevada.

The Lockheed F-117 had several nicknames. The official one was Nighthawk. A couple of other included Cockroach (it is a small, black entity that scurries in the night) and Wobbly Goblin (a nasty creature that was aerodynamically unstable). However, most pilots who flew it normally referred to it as the Black Jet.


The fighter was 47 feet long, 22 feet across and capable of 600 knots airspeed (~Mach .95). It was not designed to be supersonic because supersonic aircraft with the the associated sonic booms are not very stealthy. Fifty-nine aircraft were delivered to the Air Force. While designed to carry air-to-air missiles and nuclear weapons, none of the F-117's were configured to do this. Instead, the F-117's standard load was two GBU-27s—2000 pound laser guided bombs. The jet flew beautifully, but was underpowered. A autopilot could be engaged after takeoff and fly an entire mission for the pilot, getting to any location within 1 second of any scheduled time-on-target.

Fifty-nine Aircraft cost \$6.5 billion for a total project cost of \$8 billion—inexpensive by today's standard. The F-117 had no on board radar, but possessed a highly accurate navigation and weapon targeting system. It achieved operational capability achieved in 1983 and in 1989 the F117 is brought into the open. The F-117 was employed in the following conflicts:

- Operation JUST CAUSE 1989
 - F117 selected because it dropped precision munitions on time
 - Just prior to takeoff, told not to hit the barracks—just get close
 - In the US many stated the stealth fighter failed—it "missed" the target
- Operation DESERT STORM 1991
 - Highly successful—1271 missions—2000 tons of bombs
 - F117 did not require significant of support
- Operation ALLIED FORCE
 - Many successful missions
 - F117 lost through excellent tactics and Serbian luck
- Operational IRAQI FREEDOM
 - Quick reaction and high precision strike
 - F117s featured aircraft for first attacks
 - April 2008 the F117 was retired as a cost savings measure

THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY





Opening June 4th, 2020, one of the country's newest and most exciting museums is scheduled to open to celebrate over 240 years of United States Army history and foster continuing education long into the future. Located on 84 acres in Fort Belvoir, Virginia, the center is primed to serve as a significant regional destination for veterans, families, active duty military, school groups, tourists, and more. Just 20 minutes from Washington, D.C. National Mall, the museum will stand among the many world-class institutions which surround it and it is sure to be the most comprehensive historical representation of the U.S. Army from the founding of the United States up to the present day. All of this is thanks to a unique joint effort between the U.S. Army and the non-profit organization The Army Historical Foundation (AHF).

As the capstone museum of the Army Museum Enterprise, the National Army Museum will provide the only comprehensive portrayal of Army history and traditions. The Museum also will offer educational experiences to illustrate the Army's role in building and defending our nation, as well as humanitarian missions, public contributions, and technological and medical breakthroughs. From the Revolutionary War to current conflicts, from General George Washington to General George Patton, from muskets to modern weapons, this museum will be all things 'Army'.

The site of the museum will be located at Fort Belvoir, Fairfax County, Virginia. The Museum itself is also of historic significance, as Fort Belvoir has long been a strategic base for the U.S. Army and is, therefore, a critical location in determining and maintaining the country's defense strategy. It's the perfect location for a museum of this caliber and sets the scene for what is sure to be an incredible learning experience. Located on the shores of the Potomac River and just miles from Washington's home in Mount Vernon and the monuments of the nation's capital, the setting is rich in both history and natural beauty.

When the Museum opens to the public, the U.S. Army will own and operate the Museum while AHF will manage the Museum store, café, and catering services for special events. Within the Army organizational structure, the Museum is part of the U.S. Army Center of Military History whose higher headquarters is the Office of the Administrative Assistant to the Secretary of the Army.



NEW SCAM!

The following is a recounting of the incident from the victim:

Wednesday a week ago, I had a phone call from someone saying that he was from some outfit called: "Express Couriers," (The name could be any courier company). He asked if I was going to be home because there was a package for me that required a signature.

The caller said that the delivery would arrive at my home in roughly an hour. Sure enough, about an hour later, a uniformed delivery man turned up with a beautiful basket of flowers and a bottle of wine. I was very surprised since there was no special occasion or holiday, and I certainly didn't expect anything like it. Intrigued, I inquired as to who the sender was.

The courier replied, "I don't know, I'm only delivering the package."

Apparently, a greeting card was being sent separately. (The card has never arrived!) There was also a consignment note with the gift.

He then went on to explain that because the gift contained alcohol, there was a \$3.50 "delivery/ verification charge," providing proof that he had actually delivered the package to an adult (of legal drinking age), and not just left it on the doorstep where it could be stolen or taken by anyone, especially a minor.

This sounded logical and I offered to pay him cash. He then said that the delivery company required payment to be by credit or debit card only, so that everything is properly accounted for, and this would help in keeping a legal record of the transaction.

He added, "Couriers don't carry cash to avoid loss or likely targets for robbery."

My husband, who by this time was standing beside me, pulled out his credit card, and the "delivery man," asked him to swipe the card on a small mobile card machine with a small screen and keypad. Frank, my husband, was asked to enter his PIN number and a receipt was printed out. He was given a copy of the transaction.

The guy said everything was in order and wished us good day.

To our horrible surprise, between Thursday and the following Monday, \$4,000 had been charged/withdrawn from our credit/debit account at various ATM machines.

Apparently the "mobile credit card machine," which the deliveryman carried now had all the info necessary to create a "dummy" card with all our card details including the PIN number.

Upon finding out about the illegal transactions on our card, we immediately notified the bank which issued us a new card, and our credit/debit account was closed.

We also personally went to the police, where it was confirmed that it is definitely a scam because several households had been similarly hit.

WARNING: Be wary of accepting any "surprise gift or package," which you neither expected nor personally ordered, especially if it involves any kind of payment as a condition of receiving the gift or package. Also, never accept anything If you do not personally know or there is no proper identification of who the sender is.

Above all, the only time you should give out any personal credit/debit card information is when you yourself initiated the purchase or transaction!

PLEASE, pass this on, it may just prevent someone else from being swindled



AMERICAN FLAG DISPLAY FAQ

Can a flag that has covered a casket be displayed after its original use?

There are no provisions in the Flag Code to suggest otherwise. It would be a fitting tribute to the memory of the deceased veteran and his or her service to a grateful nation if the casket flag is displayed.

Can the U.S. flag be displayed in inclement weather?

The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, with the exception of an all-weather (nylon or other non-absorbent material) flag. However, most flags are made of all-weather materials.

What is the significance of displaying the flag at half-

This gesture is a sign to indicate the nation mourns the death of an individual(s), such as death of the president or former president, vice president, Supreme Court justice, member of Congress, secretary of an executive or military department, etc. Only the president or a state governor may order the flag to be displayed at half-staff. The honor and reverence accorded this solemn act is quickly becoming eroded by those individuals and agencies that display the flag at half-staff on inappropriate occasions without proper authority to do so.

When the flag is not flown from a staff, how should it be displayed?

It should be displayed vertically, whether indoors or out, and suspended so that its folds fall free as though the flag were staffed. The stripes may be displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, and the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right (that is, to the observer's left). When displayed in a window of a home or a place of business, the flag should be displayed in the same way (that is, with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street).

How are unserviceable flags destroyed?

The Flag Code suggests that when a flag has served its

useful purpose, "it should be destroyed, preferably by burning." For individual citizens. this should be done discreetly so the act of destruction is not perceived as a protest or desecration. Many American Legion posts conduct disposal of unserviceable flag ceremonies on June 14, Flag Day. Such ceremonies are particularly dignified and solemn occasions for the retirement of unserviceable

Can the flag be washed or dry-cleaned?

Yes. No provisions of the Flag Code prohibit such care. The decision to wash or drvclean would depend on the material.

Are you required to destroy the flag if it touches the ground?

The Flag Code states that the flag should not touch anything beneath it, including the ground. This is stated to indicate that care should be exercised in the handling of the flag, to protect it from becoming soiled or damaged. You are not required to destroy the flag when this happens. As long as the flag remains suitable for display, even if washing or dry-cleaning is reguired, you may continue to display the flag as a symbol of our great country.

What is the proper method for folding the flag?

The Flag Code does not require any specific method. However, a tradition of folding has developed over time that produces a triangular-shaped form, like that of a three-corner hat with only the blue union showing.

May a person, other than a veteran, have his or her casket draped with the flag of the **United States?**

Yes. Although this honor is usually reserved for veterans or highly regarded state and national figures, the Flag Code does not prohibit this use.

What is the significance of the gold fringe seen on some U.S. flags?

Records indicate that fringe was first used on the flag as early as 1835. It was not until 1895 it was officially added to the national flag for all Army regiments. For civilian use, fringe is not required as an integral part of the flag, nor can its use be said to constitute an unauthorized addition to the design prescribed by statute. Fringe is used as an honorable

Much credit is due to Grande du South Carolina for hosting our 100th Promenade Nationale. It went very smoothly and we missed the hurricanethank goodness. The weather was a might warm for us "ole boys & girls" from the North, but we'll take it. We had the most registrations in years at this Promenade Nationale.

March 2019 Voiture Nationale obtained a loan from the Carville Star program to pay the bank note on the Head-quarters building. The loan was for \$84,348.21 at 5% interest for 6 years (72 months). Since March 2019 Voiture Nationale has made a monthly payment of \$1,358.42 to repay the loan. The outstanding loan balance is currently \$76,954.73. There has been \$11,563.13 donated to the building fund since March 2019. The Correspondant National and

Finance Committee have instructed Voiture Nationale to make an additional \$11, 563.13 payment back to Carville star this month. Instructions were also given to apply the payment to the principal balance and continue making the same approximate monthly payment (now \$1,354.80). This will shorten the repayment schedule from the current balance of 65 months to 54 months.

Each year at Promenade Nationale the Ritual Committee presents their idea of a new Password. The word is approved by the body when the Directeur National Ritual reads the minutes on the Floor on Friday. Charles W. Ardery Memorial Child Welfare Trust Fund



This is the beginning of a New Year, a New Century for the 40&8. This year I am the Charles W Ardery Trust Fund (CATF) Disbursement Board Chairman. As such, I would first wish to bring up last year's stats. There were six Grandes which participated, 16 claims submitted for 42 children. The total funds submitted were \$8,490.81 with a reimbursement of \$6,325.97.

Charles W. Ardery Trust Fund is an extremely rewarding program. With this sort of participation maybe Voyageurs are not aware of what this program is and what it may do for you, your Locale and especially the members of Your Community. The primary function of the CATF is to provide reimbursement of funds expended by a Voiture Locale or Grand, in meeting the emergent needs of children 17 years old or younger. It is limited to \$300.00 per individual child, with a maximum claim limit of \$1,000.00 per single family. The total amount of program claims, beginning June 1st of each year, which can be approved for any single Grand is limited to \$5,000.00 per program year.

Claims determined by the CATF to be "emergent" are defined as; A situation which has developed of a serious nature,

which demands prompt action. A situation is an event caused by natural disasters, flood, tornado, hurricane, fire, volcano, etc.

For situations caused by society, such as the loss of parental support, discretionary consideration will be exercised. Action will be based totally on the facts and circumstances of the situation, as explained by the claim, and exceptionally justified by the documentation and evidence submitted, at the time of the claim. Justification of why assistance was not available through other established public or private agencies must be addressed.

What is considered reimbursable; Expenditures should be Limited to clothing and shoes. Toys are not considered emergent nor essential. Food assistance is available through other public and private agencies such as your local food pantry. School lunches are the same. School Supplies may also be obtained through other public and private agencies but may be taken into consideration. Gifts of cash are never acceptable. Above all, an originating Voiture or Grand MUST always remember that it is spending its own money first ... and the rules of the program carry no guaranteed reimbursement of expenses, in any instances.

Vice Presidential History

William Rufus King (April 7, 1786 – April 18, 1853) was the 13th vice president of the United States for six weeks in 1853 before his death. Earlier he had been elected as a U.S. representative from North Carolina and a senator from Alabama. He also served as minister to France during the reign of King Louis Philippe I.

A Democarat, he was a Unionist and his contemporaries considered him to be a moderate on the issues of sectionalism, slavery and westward expansion, which contributed to the American Civil War. He helped draft the Compromise of 1850. He is the only United States executive official to take the oath of office on foreign soil; he was inaugurated in Havana, Cuba, due to poor health. King died of tuberculosis after 45 days in office. With the



exceptions of John Tyler and Andrew Johnson—both of whom succeeded to the presidency—he is the shortest serving vice president.

King was born in Sampson County, North Carolina, to William King and Margaret deVane. His family was large, wealthy and well-connected. He graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1803, where he was also a member of the Philanthropic Society. Admitted to the bar in 1806 after reading the law with Judge William Duffy of Fayetteville, North Carolina, he began practice in Clinton. King was an ardent Freemason, and was a member of Fayetteville's Phoenix Lodge No. 8.

King was the only U.S. vice president from the state of Alabama and held the highest political office of any Alabamian in American history. He was the third vice president to die in office.
